"I am an ugly daughter. I am the one nobody comes for."

This helps them learn more about themselves and their culture. It also helps them deal with being both Mexican and American.

"We are one heart with two heads. And since we're one, we don't argue. We negotiate."

"He knows it's in the layers, in the curtains, in the patios with fountains, in the lace curtains, in the plants that hang from the ceiling, and in the piñatas that break open and spill candies all over the table."

Cisneros's works celebrate the multifaceted identities of women, highlighting the intersections of gender, ethnicity, and culture, and affirming the importance of self-expression and self-determination.

The resilience of female characters in Cisneros's novels reflects broader themes of cultural identity and resistance, showcasing the endurance of marginalized communities in the face of social and political oppression.

The intersectional analysis of author's works reveals the interconnectedness of gender with other identity markers, such as race and class, illustrating the complexity of female experiences and the need for inclusive approaches to empowerment.

Cisneros's novels leave a lasting legacy in literature, inspiring readers to engage critically with issues of gender, power, and representation.

Moving forward, future research should continue to explore their relevance in contemporary discourse.

РЕЗЮМЕ

У курсовій роботі досліджено, як Сандра Сіснерос у своїх новелах показує і розповідає про те, що жінки сильні, мають контроль і знають, ким вони є. Уважно вивчивши такі книги, як «House on Mango Street», «Woman Hollering Greek», and «Caramelo» було виявлено різні способи, якими Сандра Сіснерос показує жінок, що здобувають владу у своїх історіях.

Дослідження показує, що Сіснерос не дотримується звичних уявлень про те, якими мають бути чоловіки та жінки. Вона пише про героїнь, які стоять за себе і йдуть всупереч тому, чого від них очікує суспільство. Її історії також показують, як жінки знаходять внутрішню силу і мужність у важкі часи, приймають свою відмінну ідентичність і пишаються своїм культурним походженням. Крім того, історії Сіснерос показують, як гендер, раса і клас порізному впливають на життя жінок. Це допомагає нам зрозуміти, що жіночий досвід дуже складний.

Отже, наскільки потужною може бути література, яка змінює популярні історії, робить голос людей, яких часто ігнорують, гучнішим, допомагає людям почуватися сильнішими і робити суспільство кращим. Книги Сандри Сіснерос важливі для того, щоб говорити про справедливість для всіх гендерів, показувати різні типи людей і переконувати, що до кожного ставляться справедливо. Її книги допомагають зробити суспільство більш справедливим і включати в нього кожного.
